ABOUT THE COVER,

"I believe in ... the resurrection of the body" (Apostles' Creed, Third Article). We are all subject to the laws of physics. So was Jesus. He, with us, was and is a physical being. The mystery of the Incarnation is central to our faith and worship, the truth that God became "flesh and bone" to die for our sins and to be raised again for our justification.

The physical things of worship which surround us as we sing and pray and look and listen communicate the love of God to us, that we in turn may share that love with each other and the wider world. No more poignantly is this expressed than in the holy Meal. The great and gracious spiritual gifts of forgiveness, life, and salvation transmitted in the Sacrament are given by means of the very common and simple physical elements of bread and wine. The physical eating and drinking are, according to Luther, the chief thing in the Sacrament next to the word of God (see "The Sacrament of the Altar," Luther's *Small Catechism*, ELW page 1166). At Jesus' invitation, we physically rise and come to the table to receive the gift, His very Presence. Bread and wine, body and blood, are consumed, and we, collectively His body, are nourished spiritually, and, really, physically. We, the Church, are a living organism, who receive our life from our Creator-Redeemer-Sanctifier, Body and Blood given and shed "for you."

Keep in mind, we are receiving the living, not a dead, Christ in the Sacrament. He said to His disciples, "Take, eat, this is my body, given for you" and "take, drink, this is my blood, shed for you for the forgiveness of sins" while He was very much alive, on the night before his crucifixion, the first evening of Passover.

And He is alive again, the One who was crucified, dead, and buried, and, today, risen from the dead.

It may be helpful to think of our Holy Communion as a *continuation* of the Last Supper, not a mere *repetition* of it, an extension of Jesus' action at table flowing down even to us and to all, throughout the whole world and to this present day. As the pastor proclaims the Words of Institution (what Luther called the gospel in a nutshell) over the bread and wine, we are, in a sense, transported to that Upper Room and are at once in the presence of our Savior to receive at Jesus' own hand (by way of the pastor) the gift of Himself. What comfort, joy, and peace! The Church participates in and celebrates this service of Communion in churches all around the world every day! And the gift never runs out, and like the feeding of the multitudes in Jesus' day, there is plenty left over. The loaves abound, the cup runs over.

In today's Gospel, a flesh and blood Jesus—not a ghost!—appears to his astonished and frightened disciples. He, the Resurrection and the Life, greets them with peace and shows them his wounded hands and feet. "Touch me," He says (a ghost has no substance) and asks for something to eat (a ghost has no need for food).

The detail from our Ascension Window (last window on the right, above the pulpit), as pictured on the bulletin cover, shows the nail print in Jesus' right hand, which is open in a gesture of offering. His hand is contrasted against His blood-red cloak, symbol of His humanity and His bloody sacrifice on the Cross, and the bright azure of the sky, which is receiving Him in glory. We read in Scripture that, on the 40th day (of Easter), He bodily ascended into heaven where He is seated—His physical, uncorrupted, incorruptible body, wounds and all—at the right hand of the Father, where He intercedes for us and prepares for us a place.

Thinking back to the first three centuries of the Church, when most of its activities were clandestine because Christianity was illegal, the physicality of the Church was apparent only in the believers themselves. There were no church buildings. Christians worshiped in secret. So their several bodies, gathered together as one body, to eat and drink the body and blood of Jesus and be nourished on His holy words, was their life and worship. They themselves, united with their Lord and living Head, Jesus Christ, were the visible Church, not made of stone and timber but of flesh and blood, "living stones," many of whom were killed for their faith, their names filling up the martyrologies of the nascent Church.

Recently, the Church celebrated the Feast of the Annunciation, commemorating the announcement to Mary by the Angel Gabriel that she would become the mother of God's Son, Jesus, Emmanuel, the Incarnate Word. The date of this feast is March 25; however, in 2024, this date fell during Holy Week, the days of which take precedence over any other festival. In much of Christendom, Easter Week likewise does not permit other festivals to be celebrated. The festival is then transferred to the first open day thereafter. So, in the Lutheran Church, the Annunciation was transferred to the first open date after Easter, April 1 (see "Christ in Our Home"). In the Episcopal Church, this festival was moved to April 8, the Monday after Easter Week. Both the Prayer of the Day and the Second Reading are noteworthy, as the Incarnation is tied so tightly to the Crucifixion, Resurrection, Ascension, yes, and even Pentecost. Which means, the Incarnation is tied to our very life as sinful human beings who walk the face of this earth as we make our journey, in the body, or, to use a biblical phrase, in our earthly tent, towards our heavenly home, towards that building eternal in the heavens, the city that has foundations, seen from afar even by Abraham. Here is the Prayer of the Day, really a prayer for any season: Pour your grace into our hearts, O God, that we who have known the Incarnation of your Son, Jesus Christ, announced by an angel, may by his Cross and Passion be brought to the glory of his Resurrection; for he lives and reigns ... (ELW, page 55). And, from the Epistle: ... when Christ came into the world, he said, "Sacrifices and offerings you have not desired, but a body you have prepared for me. ... Then I said, 'See, God, I have come to do your will, O God.' ... And it is by God's will that we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all. (for the entire reading, see Hebrews 10:4-10)

So we are here this morning to get physical and to worship "in the beauty of holiness," a phrase applicable to both the holy things around us and also our inner holiness of attitude and behavior. To quote the beloved hymn: "For the joy of ear and eye, for the heart and mind's delight, for the mystic harmony linking sense to sound and sight: Christ, our God, to you we raise this our sacrifice of praise."
