WORD

FIRST LESSON, Acts 8:26-40

²⁶An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) ²⁷So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship ²⁸and

was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. ²⁹Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." ³⁰So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" ³¹He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. ³²Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

"Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter,

and like a lamb silent before its shearer,

so he does not open his mouth.

³³In his humiliation justice was denied him.


Who can describe his generation?

For his life is taken away from the earth."

³⁴The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" ³⁵Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. ³⁶As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" ³⁸He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. ³⁹When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. ⁴⁰But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

SECOND LESSON, 1 John 4:7-21

⁷Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. ⁸Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. ⁹God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. ¹⁰In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. ¹¹Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. ¹²No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

¹³By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. ¹⁴And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. ¹⁵God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. ¹⁶So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. ¹⁷Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. ¹⁸There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. ¹⁹We love because he first loved us. ²⁰Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. ²¹The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.






THE LORD'S PRAYER

ABOUT THE COVER,

"Look, here is water!" Thus exclaims the Ethiopian eunuch after being united with Philip the Evangelist (as the Church has named him) through the word of God in the prophet

Isaiah. As we hear in today's First Reading from Acts, Philip's scriptural guidance leads to this foreigner's immediate baptism and the first steps of his walk with Jesus.

Baptism is a central theme of Easter. That God invites those outside the faith to be grafted into the living Vine, Jesus Christ, and thus be nourished, experience growth, and bear fruit, is likewise a theme that, like ever widening concentric circles spreading out over the world to enfold all nations, peoples, and languages, gathers momentum throughout the Easter season, culminating in the great outpouring of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost.

On older calendars, today was the Fourth Sunday *after* Easter and was also given the Latin name *Cantate* from the opening words of the historic introit for the day, "O sing unto the Lord a new song, alleluia: for he hath done marvelous things, alleluia," the words of which still appear in our lectionary in next Sunday's psalm of the day. Both our Gathering Hymn and Hymn of the Day are relatively new songs (see the credits). Compare these with the Sending Hymn, and you will find that a century separates them. Yet there exists a freshness with each new singing, simply because the message is ever new and ever renewing; it never grows old. God's word gives us a reason to sing and, in singing the words of these hymns, gives us a means by which to express the faith within us. So, even we oldsters remain young in the words and music of our worship. And the children—well, everything is new to them! And new Christians (like the Ethiopian eunuch) also sing a new song when they join in the old songs some of us have sung our whole life long.

This year marks the 500th anniversary of the first Lutheran hymnal, *Etlich Cristlich Lider* ... ("Some Christian Songs ... "—the full title is much longer). Luther, in collaboration with Paul Speratus, produced the hymnal of just eight hymns (popularly referred to as *Das Achtliederbuch*, literally, "eight-song book"), in 1524, only seven years after his posting of the 95 Theses. It was printed in Nuremberg, though the title page shows Wittemberg as the city of publication. (This is the city in which the hymnal was first used, the same city where Luther posted his controversial theses on the door of the castle church on October 31, 1517.) So popular was the hymnal that by year's end a second hymnal of 26 hymns was published, the *Erfurt Enchiridion*. How many hymns are in our current hymnal? (Mind, the first 150 are psalms and the next 88 are "Service Music" (i.e., Kyries, canticles, etc.). And how many did not make it from the previous hymnal? And how many more are in our supplemental hymnals and other denominational hymnals? We will, of course, celebrate this anniversary in future articles. (I feel another series coming on! but my time is limited, so I will also endeavor to limit my words.)

So, now, on this new day, let us "sing with all the people of God, and join in the hymn of all creation: Blessing, honor, glory, and might be to God and the Lamb forever. Amen." C. A. Michaelsen
