




"I used to stay home alone when my parents worked on their farm. Now that we have a nursery school, I go to school and play with my friends."

## Healthy Children and Families

More boys and girls have access to clean water and healthcare. Through 22 new water supply systems, 403 children drink safe water. At a new health center, 3,407 parents access health services for their children. As a result, 204 children received vaccines, 23 were treated for diarrhea and 19 for malaria.



### **Education for Better Lives**

More children are going to school and enjoying good learning environments. After 3,057 parents learned about the importance of nursery school, 203 children were enrolled in early childhood education. In addition, 4,000 children have benefited from reading clubs, materials, teacher training and hygiene facilities.



## Child Protection and Care

More children and families understand their rights. Parents and school leaders are building safe environments after 120 committee members and 230 families learned about child protection. In addition, 90 children's forum members and 10 children's clubs learned to protect themselves.



## Love of God and Neighbors

More children are growing spiritually. More children understand the love of God after 25 Sunday school teachers received training. In addition, 300 children participated in a special event where they learned more about their faith and expressed themselves artistically.

"I never thought I would be able to read and understand a story by myself. I used to read repeating words in my native tongue and could not identify letters by myself. This made me uncomfortable, and I thought about dropping out of school in third grade. I was ashamed of my bad class rank," says Innocent, 10 years old.

"Because of these difficulties, I joined a reading club. I attend with my two younger sisters. I am learning how to identify letters and read storybooks. I can borrow books, and my sister helps me read them. My favorite story is about the lion and the rabbit.

"This year, I will perform well at school. I can even read the Bible at church in front of other children because I have no fear about my pronunciation."
